


POWERteam

They boarded a ship in the fall and after 7 long weeks at sea, they arrived in Cambodia in February 1961 exactly 60 years ago.

Younger pastors and IW's want to Finish Well

Gerry Gould is the son of Bob & Louella Gould. Bob was one of the founding members of our leadership **POWER Team**. Gerry, like most of us have had leaders we looked up to, to advance our own effectiveness for the Kingdom of God. The Apostle Paul said ***“Follow me as I follow Christ. Those things that you have learned, and heard, and seen in me do, and the God of peace will be with you.”*** Gerry writes.....

I have been thinking deeply over this year's revelations concerning two very influential leaders from whom I have learned so much. On the other side of "reeling" at these discoveries (and others), I have reflected on my own heart and its potential for sin of many kinds. Not that I have any desire nor intent to be unfaithful to Christ, Leah, my kids, my calling or Summit. But it gives me pause to examine my inner world, my practices, relationships and accountabilities that help me desire and foster increased purity, righteousness, integrity, holiness and faithfulness.

I sensed the Holy Spirit encouraging me in my commitments. ***“Above all else, guard your heart, for everything you do flows from it.”*** (Proverbs 4:23 NIV); ***“Therefore let anyone who thinks that he stands take heed, lest he fall.”*** (1 Corinthians 10:12 ESV); ***“Now may the God of peace Himself sanctify you completely, and may your whole spirit and soul and body be kept blameless at the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ. He who calls you is faithful; He will surely do it.”*** (1 Thess. 5:23-24 ESV).



I believe it is the personal, private, 'small' compromises over time that build the stage from which our public falls are proclaimed to the world. Therefore, I pray that the Lord will continue His deep sanctifying work in me. I also pray that I will continue to be responsive to the Holy Spirit, not only being ruthless to flee from that which leads to sin, but also to increasingly pursue the cultivation of godly desire for holiness.

I thank God for others who have made deliberate decisions to walk with me in this path, for we will not be able to do so alone. 
POWER Team member Finishes Well

Dr. Ward Gasque, worker emeritus, passed away on Dec.29, 2020.

W. Ward Gasque, Professor Emeritus of Biblical Studies at Regent College and a long-respected scholar on the Acts of the Apostles. Ward died in Vancouver on December 29, 2020. He was eighty-one years old.



Ward was a founding member of Regent's faculty, teaching New Testament at the College for twenty-two year. (much more in the obituary link if you want it.)

In 1998 he took on his final academic post as President of the Pacific Association for Theological Studies in Seattle. Following his work in academia, he served the Richmond Chinese Alliance Church in Vancouver, BC, first as English Pastor and then as Pastor for Education and Outreach.

Lena Brown, wife of Bill

On March 6, 2021 Lena Brown was called to her home in glory. Lena served alongside her husband Bill Brown in seven of our Alliance churches in B.C. and Alberta over a period of 52 years. Over that time, Lena was a strong supporter of women's ministries, including providing leadership within the Women's Missionary Prayer Fellowship. She loved to sing in choirs and, perhaps even more than singing, she loved teaching children. The many years she volunteered her time as a Vacation Bible School teacher and Sunday School teacher (many say the best one they ever had) are testimony to her passion of teaching and caring for children. She was a kindergarten teacher's aide for many years and later on in life she served as a food demonstrator for Safeway. She was particularly known for her demonstrations in the seafood department. Patrons would ensure they did their shopping on



days when Lena was present because they loved her and the food she prepared! When most of her friends were retired, Lena's entrepreneurial spirit led her to start up her own small business of providing grocery shopping services to seniors. Her generosity, kindness and loving approach to all she encountered will not be forgotten and she leaves a legacy that many seek to emulate; especially her children and grandchildren. She is survived by her husband of 65 years, Bill, two daughters and a son. They have eight grandchildren and one great-grandchild. She taught them how to love unconditionally and they all long for the day when they will see her again.

Through this latest test of COVID-19 restrictions, ministries have been delivered via zoom and phone calls, with a couple of 'in person' gatherings outdoors, this summer. We have both been involved with another online course: Transform Prayer course since 2019. This year, we helped launch and facilitate three French language cohorts for this course. The French courses are on hold for the moment, but should restart later this Fall.

Michael still serves on the Board of ETEQ (École théologique évangélique du Québec) as secretary. So, more zoom meetings involved there.

Once the COVID-19 restrictions let up, we are hoping to reconnect with our six children and 19 grandchildren 😊, of course at different moments. The fact that we live on

the sea shore (banks of the St Lawrence, which is 45km wide here), makes our place like a cottage for the family. We have some great moments together 😊

The old lady then told the teller that she wanted to withdraw \$300,000 from her account.


The teller did so quickly and handed it to the old lady respectfully.

The old lady kept \$500 in her bag and asked the teller to deposit the balance of \$299,500 back into her account.



WHY ENGLISH IS HARD TO LEARN


We'll begin with *box*; the plural is *boxes*,
